



NO LABELS KANSAS PARTY

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LAWRENCE - No Labels Kansas Party announced today that David G. Miller of Lawrence has been elected Chairman of the recently recognized political party.

Miller's political resume is extensive:

- Former State Representative - District 43
- Elected by colleagues to serve as Chairman of the Legislative Post Audit Committee
- Former Lt. Governor candidate, running with real estate executive, Nestor Weigand, Jr.
- Founding Chairman of the Kansas Christian Coalition
- Former Kansans for Life PAC Director
- Former Chairman of the Kansas Republican Party, twice elected unanimously
- Former Member of the Republican National Committee
- Former candidate for Governor

Miller is largely credited with building the conservative movement into a political juggernaut, eventually wresting control of the Kansas GOP from self-described moderate Republicans under former Governor Bill Graves.

“David is legendary in Kansas politics,” noted two-time President of Kansans for Life, Tim Golba. “He took the rag-tag, disorganized base of the GOP and turned it into a truly effective movement that changed the course of Kansas political history. It’s no exaggeration to say that conservatives serving in office today are standing on David Miller’s shoulders.”

Doug Johnson, former Chairman of the Kansas Christian Coalition, current Chairman of the Kansas Equal Rights Amendment Committee, and Secretary of No Labels Kansas Party noted, “Democrats are hopelessly stuck in loony leftist land while Republicans have drifted away from the conservative principles once found in the GOP platform. Whether giving billions to foreign corporations and wealthy sports franchise owners, allowing Kansas land and resources to be gobbled up by massive energy farms and data centers, or demonstrating indifference to continuing to fight for the unborn, it’s clear that the uniparty in Topeka has lost its way.”

John Altevogt is a former columnist for the *Kansas City Star* and member of the KCK Landmark Commission. He is currently a member of this region’s Selective Service Board, and also serves as Treasurer of No Labels Kansas Party. Altevogt said, “The saddling of local taxpayers with higher taxes and yet-to-be-revealed infrastructure costs to subsidize the out-of-state billionaire Hunt family is the worst kind of socialism and a glaring example that both parties have become little more than two heads of the same snake. Like the Panasonic giveaway before it, this sweetheart

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'deal' was negotiated in secret, many of the details remain under wraps, and lawmakers attempted, and failed, to hide their negotiations from public scrutiny by exempting their activities from the Kansas Open Meetings and Kansas Open Records Acts. This is massive in Kansas City, where I live, and is a huge sleeper issue that every Kansan should be loudly protesting."

A plebiscite election was held in which each registered No Labels Kansas Party voter was mailed a ballot on which was printed a proposed constitution and set of by-laws, an initial slate of recommended State Executive Committee members, and space for ballot recipients to nominate other No Labels Kansas Party registrants to serve on the committee. The recommended slate was elected and the constitution and by-laws, which authorized the State Executive Committee to take steps to further organize and grow the party, were ratified. Among such steps was the election of party officers, including selecting a new chairman.

Miller, chosen unanimously, honed in on the changing nature of Kansas government.

"The Kansas legislature was set up to be a citizen legislature, made up of neighbors who shared voters' values, background, and common interests," Miller said. "For a century-and-a-half, it served the people of this state well. But with a recent 93% increase in their own pay, slashing their work week back to four days for just four months out of the year, and padding their own retirements with perks and privileges, the legislature is looking nothing like the body in which I served for ten years. Kansans need to decide if being governed by an elitist professional political class is what they want out of their state government. I doubt it."

No Labels Kansas Party is the fastest growing political party in the state. Recognized on January 17, 2024 as Kansas' fifth political party, by November of 2025 No Labels registrants already numbered more than 6,000. While the Republican and Democratic parties lost members over the past six months, No Labels Kansas Party has seen a surge in registrations, climbing by more than 16% during the same period.

"We are building a new party from the ground up and are committed to challenging the status quo offered by the Topeka establishment. As it stands, we're already more than 6 ½ times larger than United Kansas and are gaining rapidly on the Libertarian Party. At this pace, we expect to be Kansas's third largest party by the time this year's general election arrives," Miller said.

He continued, "We intend to give voters a real choice at the ballot box, rather than being forced to choose between two candidates representing the uniparty that runs Topeka. Kansans are fed up and should not have their choices limited to one party representing big government or the other representing big business. We expect the establishment to attempt to quash any competition but are prepared to fight to build a strong, viable alternative. Further, we intend to fully engage in this year's elections. We already have candidates expressing interest in running under our party's banner and are actively seeking others who share our values and vision. We intend not only to field candidates, but to help as many of them win as possible."

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
