**LAWRENCE** - David G. Miller, Chairman of the embattled No Labels Kansas party, responded to the announcement that President Donald Trump has endorsed Republican Senator Ty Masterson in the race for Kansas Governor:

“I’m a little shocked, frankly, that the President’s political team would go out on a limb to endorse this candidate before he has even named a running mate or qualified to appear on the ballot. I’ve been in Kansas politics for a long time and don’t recall anyone endorsing a candidate yet to be named. Very strange.”

“The President appears to be attempting to thin the herd and, once again, pick winners and losers, as he defines them. We Kansans have already been subjected to more than our share of that kind of bullying and table-tipping from both currently dominant parties,” Miller said.

He continued, “As the former Chairman of the Kansas Republican Party, I have long believed that primaries are healthy. As the current Chairman of No Labels Kansas, which the uniparty clique strangling Topeka is desperate to silence and block, I am fighting to preserve competition. The people deserve real options when they vote, rather than being forced to choose between candidates pre-selected in smoke-filled back rooms like this.”

Miller observed, “With every patently illegal maneuver and outrageous stunt the Topeka uniparty pulls to block our party from participating in this year’s elections, the two-headed snake reveals what it fears most: common people organizing and taking action through channels like No Labels Kansas. We obviously pose a real threat to their self-serving, vise-like grip on power.”

No Labels Kansas party is the fastest growing political party in the Sunflower State. Officially recognized on January 17, 2024, thousands of new registrants have joined the party. Between November 2025 and May 2026, NLK saw a more than 16% increase in registrations while, during the same period, the two currently dominant parties both lost registrants.

On its current trajectory, No Labels Kansas is projected to be the state’s third largest party by the November general election.
